



I Asked AI to Learn, But I Forgot to Think

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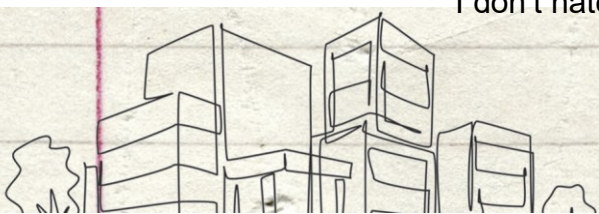
I typed, "Write me an essay about my nation."
